#### **RAY KREYER AWARD**

Why any letter carrier would talk to a postal inspector without union representation is beyond me. Please remember, if you are ever asked to answer questions from a postal inspector, have a union steward present. If there is any one single thing I've learned in thirty plus years in the postal service is that you should never be alone in a room and answering questions from these people. They are not your friends. They will try any tactic to get you to say something to incriminate yourself. Please ask for a union steward if you are ever approached by a postal inspector. The first question that you should ask is "Can this conversation lead to disciplinary action against me or another carrier?" If the answer is yes, then wait for a union steward to be present. When you make such a request the inspectors must wait for a shop steward to be present before the interview can continue.

#### **PICNIC**

On June 11th, the branch held it's annual picnic at the Los Angeles Equestrian Center in Burbank. Special thanks to Vice President Calvin Brookins for the wonderful job that he did. Although we did not have to be involved with the cooking again this year I know for a fact he spends countless hours making sure all of the arrangements went well. 

# The Last Line of Defense by JASON D. COLELLO

"The last line of defense." It seems that no matter what the organization, there is always a "last line of defense" built within its infrastructure. Baseball has its pinch hitters and their bullpen, politics has its spin doctors to cover up damage created by an elected official, NATO had its ground forces incase the air strikes failed in Kosovo and corporations have their secret "last line of defense" weapons to seize market share and or sales. But all told, "the last line of defense" is simply where a group or organization turns to when all of their other avenues have failed to produce. When all the numbers on vast amounts of paper and hard disk failed to add up in the real world, "the last line of defense" is called upon to save the day. And it's no surprise that the Postal Service's last line of defense "is" the letter carrier.

DPS, the postal wonder drug to cure all of the USPS's ills is turning out to be nothing more than a terminal disease in itself. DPS cases mail worse than a casual, everything gets cased up; CFS, FOE, mark-ups, vacation holds and even mail for other routes and regions. A nightmare to say the least, but not to worry because the USPS has its "last line of defense" within the carrier craft to right the wrongs of mis-management. We'll catch all of that mis-cased and delayed mail and right the DPS wrong. We'll physically take those pieces of perpetual loop mail, the mail for other states that always wind up back in the DPS stream with delays of up to a week, and do what the DPS machine and management couldn't do and get it on its way to its correct destination. "The last line of defense."

Furthermore, when these all mighty DPS machines can't process all of the volume (most likely a plant manager's decision to get the mail out 'now.') to be loaded into its gaping but finicky mouths, the unloaded mail volume is directed to the carrier via residual mail. Because we carriers are the "last line of defense"; when machines or other humans can't do their job, it's up to us to save the day for the USPS and the bonuses of our local fearless leaders.

And what is management going to do with all of those late arriving Express mail and Priority Mail (Priority, my you-know-what) parcels that show up when the troops are leaving? Supervision starts begging any and all carriers to take an express here, or a priority there. Grabbing carriers-you know, "the last line of defense"-as they come off the street to make additional runs on these late arriving pieces of mail.

When delivery customers have issues or concerns about anything, they are mistreated by cold hard statistical pencil jockeys, leaving us carriers to repair damages created by management's doctrine of customer service.

It doesn't matter to management, because we carriers are their "last line of defense." We'll right all the wrongs, we'll deliver the DPS orphan mail, we'll deliver the late express and priority mail, we'll smooth over the patron. It all comes down to delivering mail. Management can devise all the half-baked programs they desire, but it comes down to delivery-and that can't be quantified or programmed. Only a human can deliver 'physical' mail, and only a human can interact with human patrons on their assignments. And when all of management's little pricey toys can't live up to their expectations; when all of their glorified paperwork amassed by non-productive pencil pushing desk jockeys can't get the mail delivered, it is the task of "the last line of defense" to get the job done. **WE LETTER** 

CARRIERS ARE WHAT KEEPS THE POSTAL SERVICE ALIVE. Without us, the mail won't get delivered-end of story and end of bonuses.

So believe me when I tell you, you ARE the most important cog in the USPS machinery. Be proud, no matter what type of BS those management lackeys will try to lay upon you. WE ARE THEIR LIVLEYHOOD; THEY CANNOT LIVE WITHOUT US! (But they can attempt-and are trying-to destroy us. I will discuss this in a future issue of *The Mail Call*.)
